"To the Right Worthy Sir Peter Temple Knight

May it please your worshipp with patience to heare and understand the greevances of the town of Sreate Chesham whereas your worshipp gave direction that the constables of Chesham aforesaide should deliver a list or Roule of the men of abilitie to the Assessours that they might levie the som of monie upon them: they have neglected the constables direction and have imposed greate parte of the money upon poore tradesmen whereby except your worshipp rets[e]ve them therein they are to be much burdened.

We the inhabitants of the towne of Chesham manie of us being poore tradesmen yett we are willing to paye according to our abilitie but they have rated us five fold according to the rate of parisioners (according to our valuacion for the Church and poore) we therefore most humblie beseech your worshipn that ther may be an indiferent levie made and we shall be bound to pray for your worship and shal be readie and willing therin to nerforme any thing that we may. Thus we humblie take our leave and rest

Your humble petitioners

The Inhabitants of the towne of Chesham"

NOTE:

Only £10 4s 8d of the £125 of Ship Money requested was actually collected from the residents of Chesham. The shortfall is considerably larger than the 80% reduction that the letter writers appear to think would have been reasonable.
